Outdoors: Black or Navy Jogging bottoms/leggings & Black or Navy sweatshirt/hoody, Trainers



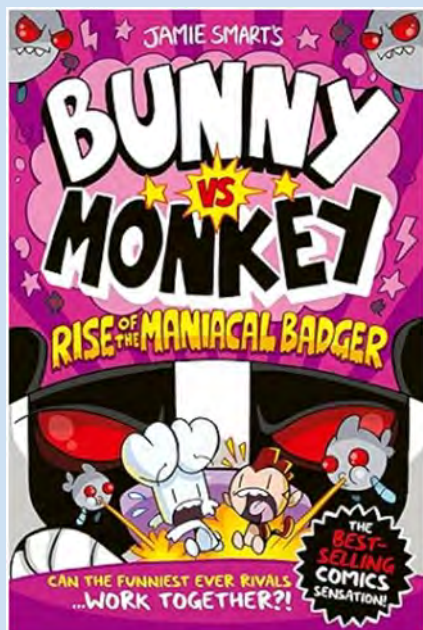
Scholastic Book Fair is coming to St Peters!

Arbor

Please keep checking Arbor for details of trips / experiences and for requests for consent and payments.

Arbor is a completely different system to ParentMail (which 'held our hands') in that I need to set up the trip and payment, and then also send an email to tell you that it's been set up. Parentmail also sent reminders—

Arbor doesn't! So please could you keep an eye on the calendar, and try and remember to give consent for things. It's trickier for me to keep on top of it all manually, so if you could help me out that would be great!

We are also unable to print out the consent form like we used to on ParentMail so we really do need you to do it through the app or on the website as we can't send a paper copy home with your child.

As a reminder, the Wraparound care will still be booked and paid for through ParentMail until September, as will paying for Bookbags & PE bags. Everything else will now be on Arbor.

Oak Class



Oak Class have been very excited to start our new topic Amazing Africa! We have explored where Africa is on the world map and learned about the seven continents. This past week we discussed the weather in Kenya and how it differs to the UK.

Last week we were visited by the dental community lead. She read us 'Open Wide, What's Inside' and we learned a lot about how to properly take care of our teeth.



We also had a visit from community police officers. They talked about their role and the class had the opportunity to ask any questions. We also got to dress up as a real police officer.

On Monday we had a tennis experience. We explored how to correctly throw, catch and hit the ball with a racket. We had a lot of fun and the sun was shining!

We had a great time in Oak Class for World Book Day. The children all looked fabulous in their costumes. The whole day was spent celebrating the stories and books that we all love in Oak. The children drew and wrote about their favourite characters. They completed a 30-minute cardboard challenge, creating something for a story character from just one sheet of card and some collage materials. Their creativity was superb – we had a boomerang made for Floyd from 'Stuck' so that he could get all the objects down from the tree; we had spades and maps made for Sam and Dave as they dug their hole; there were bowties made for Tabby McTat and even a banjo for Cat in the Hat. Such imaginations! We also did a 'Drop Everything and Read'. When a bell rang, we stopped everything we were doing and enjoyed reading a book for a few minutes before carrying on with our tasks.



In Forest School, the children have been planting out the raised bed and looking for signs of spring!

Before half term, as part our RE lesson, we made challah bread. The children had been learning about the Jewish festival of Rosh Hashanah and the significance of the food eaten then.

The children also had a taste of apple dipped into honey. They were all really good at explaining the symbolism of these foods for Jewish people.

I enjoyed dressing up as a bee.

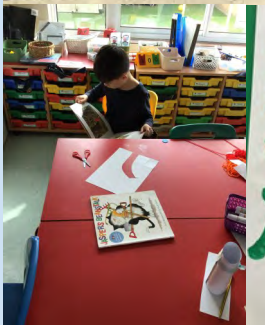
I dressed up as Paddington because it is one of my favourite stories.

The Story Museum Collections Club



We have another exciting opportunity to work with The Story Museum, in Oxford. Children in Maple and Willow classes are being invited to consider whether they would like to join The Story Museum's Collections Club. For those children who love stories and who are interested in reading new books, discussing them and sharing reviews, then this would be the perfect opportunity for them.

A member of The Story Museum team will visit our Collections Club three times a year, bringing books for the children to review. The children's reviews will be published in the Collections Club newsletter and on the 1001 Stories website.

There are other benefits of joining this club, such as receiving four newsletters each year, a membership card and up to three free visits to the museum (along with one adult family member) depending on the number of reviews that are sent in. The free visits are for the Collections Club member and their family to arrange, they cannot be used for school visits.

Here is some more information from The Story Museum about Collections Club:

WHAT IS COLLECTIONS CLUB?

The Story Museum's Collections Club are a group of young people aged 7-11 who work with the museum's Collections team to help to develop the 1001 Stories collection and the Object collection.

As a member of Collections Club you will:

- help us to choose the stories for our 1001 Stories Collection
- send us reviews, recommendations and suggestions of stories to be included in the 1001. (Reviews will be published in regular newsletters and will form part of the information held by the museum on the stories.)
- help us to decide what objects we should display and what we should tell people about them

WHO IS COLLECTIONS CLUB FOR?

We are looking for young people who:

- are aged 7-11
- love stories and want to share their favourites
- want to know what happens behind the scenes at a museum.

Maple and Willow teachers will be collecting a list of children who are interested in joining Collections Club. Do consider whether this is something your child would be interested in doing and encourage them to speak to their teacher about it if they are keen. Once we have names of those interested, Mrs Carter will liaise with staff at The Story Museum to establish how the group(s) might work best and how many children can be included in the group(s). Once our group(s) have been established, Mrs Carter will arrange for our first visit from The Story Museum staff.

This is only open to children in Key Stage Two.

Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been an incredibly busy couple of weeks and first to mention is the success of our netball team in the EPA tournament at Bartholomew on Tuesday. Mrs Glass was full of praise for the team in winning the tournament AND not conceding a single goal against the opposition! Amazing teamwork so a huge well done to Alfie, Alice, Celyn, Ivy, Leo, Luke, Poppy, and Rose. Read more about this with the children's match report elsewhere in the newsletter. Massive thanks to Mrs Glass for the lunchtime training sessions and tactics, and also for taking them to the tournament.

Last Thursday, the year 6 children went to Witney Community Hospital for their IMPS trip (injury Minimisation Programme for Schools). They covered, amongst other things, emergency first aid, CPR and hazard avoidance to reduce risks. 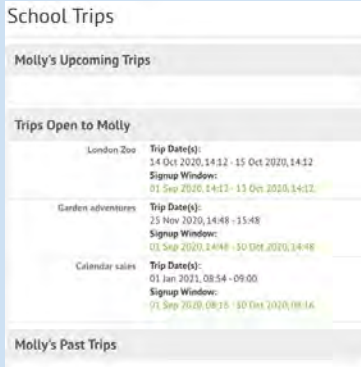
How to register your child for a trip using the Parent Portal or Parent App.

Please note that once you have signed up, you will need to contact your school if you would like to cancel participation or would like a refund.

1. From the main Parent Portal page, click on the Trips field within the Activities section.



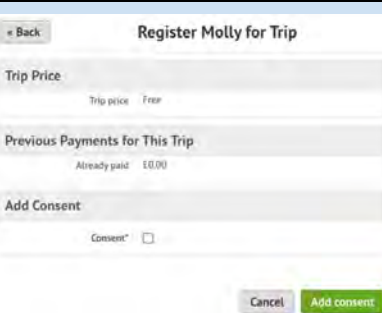
2. The Trips main page features three sections - Upcoming Trips are any trips the child is currently registered for, Past Trips are trips which have taken place and Trips Open are any trips that the child can currently be registered for.



3. To start registering a child for a trip, click on the desired trip in the Trips Open section.



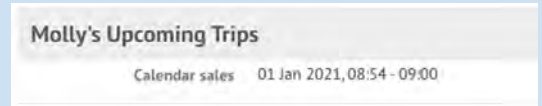
4. On the Trip Overview page, you can see details relating to the trip such as date, time and price. Click on Sign Up to begin the registration process.



Free trips

1. A slide over menu will appear where you can add consent for the trip by ticking the checkbox and ticking Add Consent.

2. Once consents have been confirmed, you will be taken back to the Trip Overview page. You will now see that the Status field will have been updated to confirmed (assuming consent was not refused).



3. When returning to the All Trips page, the trip will now be displayed in Upcoming Trips, rather than the Open Trips section.



Paid Trips

1. With trips that require a payment, the process is slightly different. When registering the student for a paid trip, click the trip to be taken to the trip overview page. Click the Sign Up button.

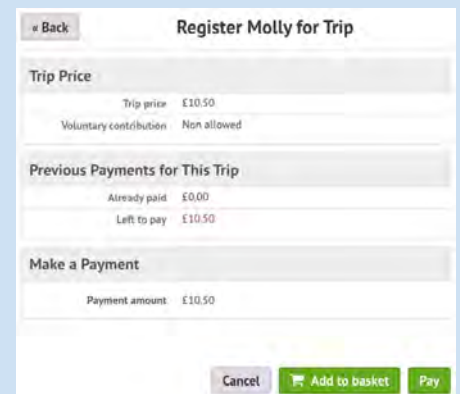
There is no option to consent for a paid

trip, as the student's place is instead confirmed by the payment made towards it.

2. A slide over will appear where you can add the amount you will pay.

3. You can then pay now or add the payment to your basket to pay later.

If you've paid the full price of the trip, the status of the trip will then change to confirmed, and the trip will appear on the All Trips page in the Upcoming Trips, rather than the Open Trips section



How to manage payments for Trips on the Arbor Parent App.

Once you have logged into the Arbor App, tap **Quick Actions** and tap **Trips** to browse available payment options. You can also navigate straight to your basket from here if you already have items in it.

Adding a Trip to Your Basket

To add trips to your basket, follow these steps:

1. Navigate to the **Trips** section of the Parent App
2. Browse the available trips and select the one you would like to sign up for
3. Tap **Add to Basket**
4. Navigate to the basket via the **Quick Actions** or the **Menu**
